USE OF PRIMARY SCHOOL SPORTS FUNDING

The government provided additional sports funding for Primary School since 2013-14 and it has been confirmed that this will be enhanced into 2017–18. The funding is allocated to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding - provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport - is allocated to primary school Headteachers.

This funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools.

Purpose of funding

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer.

This means that we should use the premium to:

- develop or add to the PE and sport activities that school already offers
- make improvements now that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

For example, we can use our funding to:

- hire qualified sports coaches to work with teachers
- provide existing staff with training or resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively
- introduce new sports or activities and encourage more pupils to take up sport
- support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs, holiday clubs and [Change4Life](#) clubs
- run sport competitions
- increase pupils' participation in the [School Games](#)
- run sports activities with other schools

How much money does Tor View receive?

In the 2014-15 academic year Tor View received	£ 8,210.
In the 2015-16 academic year Tor View received	£ 8,208
In the 2016 -17 academic year Tor View received	£ 8,204
In 2017-18 academic year indicative funding is	£16,470

How are we spending our money and what is the impact?

Since the end of the School Sports Co-ordinator Project (SSCo) Tor View has continued to employ our SSCO, Sarah Rigby as a specialist Sports teacher. She currently teaches 4 lessons per week in the Primary Department providing quality PE opportunities with an emphasis on pre-requisite skills for competitive sports. P5 access inclusive sport at Haslingden High School as part of the Inclusion project pupils are working on a diverse PE programme which includes Gymnastics and Dodgeball.

Increase range of After School Clubs	Self-sustaining (PP supports attendance for identified pupils)	Increased participation 68% pupils attended extended school sports club.
